In the Spirit of Good Debating

The Intra Collegiate Debate Competition held by the STME - Student Council on the 20th of July, 2019, for the students of The School of Technology Management and Engineering (STME) saw a thunderous response. The students took part with utmost fervor and gusto as the topics given in the first round of debate created quite a few hot heads!



For the first round, each class was divided into groups of four to five each. The topics ranged from opinion-oriented discussions like "Should the use of laptops be permitted in classrooms?" to "Is a college degree necessary to secure a good job?" to firmer and broader topics such as, "Social Media does more harm than good" or "Are single-sex schools more effective than co-ed schools?" and moved onto day-to-day discussions like "Is nepotism even acceptable?"

After a thought-provoking exchange of countless arguments and counter-arguments, the team of second year students, comprising of Adyasha Padhy, Pranav Landge, Sriharsha Garlapati, Sai Hemanth Tiruvari and Medha Dwivedi, who spoke against the notion, emerged victorious.
